Teaching Procedures



Part One Listening Comprehension

Listening Strategy Recognizing Strong and Weak Forms

1. Regulation on pronouncing weak forms:

- 1) Almost all function words words that do not have a dictionary meaning in the way that we normally expect nouns, verbs, adjectives and adverbs to have are pronounced as weak forms. These function words are articles, pronouns, prepositions, adverbs, conjunctions and auxiliary verbs.
- Suggested teaching tips: ask students to think about what function words they remember and categorize them.

Here are some examples:

article	a, an, the
pronoun	I, he, she, it, we, me, him, her, etc.
preposition	in, at, on, of, etc.
adverb	here, there, not, never, as, etc.
conjunction	and, but, etc.
auxiliary verb	am, is, are, was, were, do, does, etc.

- 2) Weak form vs. Strong form:
- Weak forms are always pronounced in the following cases:
 - * Elision of vowels and consonants
 - * Reduction of the length of sounds
 - * Obscuration of vowels towards the schwa
- Strong forms are always pronounced in the following cases:
 - * Quotation
 - * Emphasizing
 - * At the end of a sentence
 - * Comparison

Reading Strategy

Guessing Word Meaning from Context (1)

English vocabulary is extensive. Webster's Third New International Dictionary, for example, contains 460,000 words. Yet an average person's actual vocabulary is much smaller. Then what should you do when encountering unknown words while doing fast reading? You'd better not stop reading and consult your dictionary. This will slow down your reading and understanding. There are various strategies you can learn which will help you deduce what a word possibly means. One of them is to guess the meaning of unknown words from the context. Context here means words, phrases or sentences surrounding a word and the situation in which it is used. Context clues in a sentence or paragraph can help you determine the meanings of those unfamiliar words.

Context clue 1: Definition

Sometimes the writers may realize that some words are uncommon or unfamiliar to the readers. To make the word easier to understand, the writer may define the word to explain its meaning. Words or phrases like "is", "means", "refers to", "that is", "consists of", often signal definition clues. For example:

- 1) His **negligence**, that is, his carelessness in leaving his little sister alone while he went rollerblading, is appalling.
- 2) **Snoring** is a noise generated by vibrations of the soft parts of the throat during sleep.
- 3) A pilot's responsibility is to avoid putting passengers in **jeopardy**, meaning peril or danger.

Context clue 2: Restatement

Writers more often restate the unfamiliar word with the words, phrases, or sentences that come before and after a particular word and help to explain its full meaning. For example:

- 1) In Europe, the 17th century was a time of religious **dissension**, a lack of agreement about religious teaching.
- 2) In a thrilling performance, Carlos demonstrated his **zeal**, his passion, for native folk dances.
- 3) I am a **resolute** man. Once I set up a goal, I won't give it up easily.

Background Information

1. Scandinavia

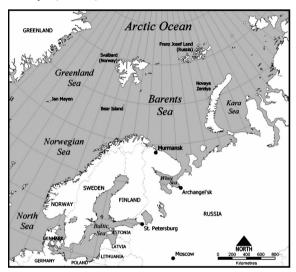
Scandinavia is a historical and geographical region centered on the Scandinavian Peninsula in Northern Europe which includes the kingdoms of Denmark, Norway and Sweden. The other Nordic countries, Finland, Iceland and the Faroe Islands, are sometimes included because of their close historic and cultural connections to Denmark, Norway and Sweden.

2. Appalachian Trail

The Appalachian National Scenic Trail, generally known as the A.T., is a 2,174 mile (3478 km) marked hiking and camping trail in the eastern United States, extending between Springer Mountain in Georgia and Mount Katahdin in Maine. Along the way, the trail also passes through the states of North Carolina, Tennessee, Virginia, West Virginia, Maryland, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, New York, Connecticut, Massachusetts, Vermont, and New Hampshire.

3. The Barents Sea

The Barents Sea is a part of the Arctic Ocean located north of Norway and Russia. It is a rather deep shelf sea (average depth 230m), bordered by the shelf edge towards the Norwegian Sea in the west, the island of Svalbard (Norway) in the northwest, and the islands of Franz Josef Land and Novaya Zemlya (Russia) in the northeast and east.



4. The Baltic Sea

The Baltic Sea is a brackish inland sea located in Northern Europe, from 53°N to 66°N latitude and from 20°E to 26°E longitude. It is bounded by the Scandinavian Peninsula, the mainland of Europe, and the Danish islands. The Baltic Sea is one of the most fascinating areas in the world — with a rich history, an unspoiled nature in a safe and secure environment.

Warm-up Activities

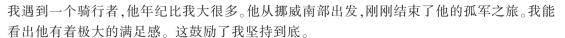
